

On July 7, 2006, the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality submitted revised human health criteria for EPA review and action. This submittal included 88 updated toxic human health criteria based on the EPA's default fish consumption rate of 17.5 grams per day. The EPA consulted with the tribes during our review of the state's revised human health toxics criteria and after completing tribal consultation, the EPA disapproved Idaho's 2006 toxic human health criteria on May 10, 2012. On August 6, 2012, DEQ notified the EPA of their intention to begin a negotiated rulemaking process to address the EPA disapproval and to develop revised human health criteria. In April 2013, the Idaho Conservation League filed a notice of intent to sue because the EPA failed to promulgate new water quality criteria for Idaho following its May 2012 disapproval of Idaho's 2006 water quality standards submission. In December 2014, the EPA and ICL entered into a settlement agreement in which the EPA agreed and is obligated to take action on Idaho's submittal of revised human health criteria by either December 15, 2016, or sixth months after the date of DEQ's submission, if their submission is received between July 31, 2015, and December 15, 2016.

On a parallel track, in December 2012, the EPA began working with tribal governments in Idaho to develop a fish consumption study which reflects current quantitative fish consumption rates based on state of the art statistical methodologies. The EPA worked closely with the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes and the Nez Perce Tribe of Idaho to complete a 12 month fish consumption survey using the Food Frequency and National Cancer Institute methodologies to better understand tribal fish consumption. The draft report was submitted to DEQ in May 2015 and a peer reviewed report was submitted by the EPA to DEQ as part of the public comment process in early September. The EPA has also been working with the tribal governments in Idaho to better understand heritage fish consumption and that information has also be provided to DEQ. A final report is expected to be completed in April 2016.

Idaho DEQ a proposed rule that was adopted by the Idaho Board of Environmental Quality in December 2015. The rule proposed a cancer risk level of 10^{-5} and a FCR of 66.5 grams/day. This rule will be considered final and effective upon adjournment of 2016 legislative session if approved by the Idaho Legislature. The rule passed the Senate Resource & Environment Committee on January 18, 2016, and passed the House Environment, Energy & Technology Committee on February 2, 2016. Idaho DEQ is expected to provide this proposed rule to EPA by July 2016.

- Daniel D. Opalski, Director, EPA Region 10 Office of Water and Watersheds, will participate in government to government consultations with Tribal governments in Idaho. We will work with tribal governments to schedule these consultations in May, June, and July 2016.
- EPA is holding two technical conference calls with Tribal Staff; additional calls may be scheduled:

 - June 14 from 10:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. PST.

Background and Description of the EPA's Water Quality Standards Action

On July 7, 2006, the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality submitted revised human health criteria for EPA review and action. This submittal included 88 updated toxic human health criteria based on the EPA's default fish consumption rate of 17.5 grams per day. The EPA consulted with the Tribes during our review of the state's revised human health toxics criteria and after completing tribal consultation, the EPA disapproved Idaho's 2006 toxic human health criteria on May 10, 2012. On August 6, 2012, DEQ notified the EPA of their intention to begin a negotiated rulemaking process to address the EPA disapproval and to develop revised human health criteria. In April 2013, the Idaho Conservation League filed a notice of intent to sue because the EPA failed to promulgate new water quality criteria for Idaho following its May 2012 disapproval of Idaho's 2006 water quality standards submission. In December 2014, the EPA and ICL entered into a settlement agreement in which the EPA agreed and is obligated to take action on Idaho's submittal of revised human health criteria by either December 15, 2016, or sixth months after the date of DEQ's submission, if their submission is received between July 31, 2015, and December 15, 2016.

On a parallel track, in December 2012, the EPA began working with tribal governments in Idaho to develop a fish consumption study which reflects current quantitative fish consumption rates based on state of the art statistical methodologies. The EPA worked closely with the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes and the Nez Perce Tribe of Idaho to complete a 12 month fish consumption survey using the Food Frequency and National Cancer Institute methodologies to better understand tribal fish consumption. The draft report was submitted to DEQ in May 2015 and a peer reviewed report was submitted by the EPA to DEQ as part of the public comment process in early September. The EPA has also been working with the tribal governments in Idaho to better understand heritage fish consumption and that information has also be provided to DEQ. A final report is expected to be completed in April 2016.

Idaho DEQ a proposed rule that was adopted by the Idaho Board of Environmental Quality in December 2015. The rule proposed a cancer risk level of 10^{-5} and a FCR of 66.5 grams/day. This rule will be considered final and effective upon adjournment of 2016 legislative session if approved by the Idaho Legislature. The rule passed the Senate Resource & Environment Committee on January 18, 2016, and passed the House Environment, Energy & Technology Committee on February 2, 2016. Idaho DEQ is expected to provide this proposed rule to EPA by July 2016.
